A word from the Principal

Welcome everyone

As you may have heard via our school Facebook site, Rob has been seconded to Cairns State High School until the end of term. While we have made some slight adjustments within our Executive team, I would like to point out that the teaching and learning of our school remains strong and Rob will be returning ready to go as your Substantive Principal starting Term 2.

As mentioned in the last newsletter, one of our school's key focus for improvement this year is attendance. Some data to confirm that together we are moving in the right direction



~ Up until the 13th March 2020 (before Covid) our whole school percentage was 90%, comparatively in 2021 our whole school percentage is now 92%.

- ~ The amount of students who attended school less than 85% of the time has now halved
- ~ Students across the school have improved their attendance substantially, in some cases by 10 to 15%.

This work will be ongoing for us all, but I would like to thank parents/carers and the community for supporting our school and ensuring every day counts and that students comes to school every day.

On Monday, we acknowledged Bullying No Way Day. It was so pleasing to see so many of our middle school leaders standing alongside Mr Mackenzie and leading our whole school parade. It was pleasing to hear the pledge being recited by everyone involved, the message was clear and concise, that bullying is unacceptable. Well done to everyone.

Later next week, Interim reports for Term 1 will be sent out. This will be a good opportunity for you to get a snap shot as to the academic progression of your child/children. Make sure to have a read, as this information may help you form some important discussion points when it comes time for the Parent and Teacher Interviews planned for Term 2.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge all the staff, students and parents who have placed their time into facilitating the highly engaging activities and sports during Term 1. A big congratulations to all Babinda students for representing our school and community with pride and giving things a go. 


World's Greatest Shave 2021 - Mr Jones



Classroom Talk - Primary Report by Mr Coverdale

I have been really pleased to observe the amount of commitment being shown by all of our students in the primary school this Term. Students have been listening to their teachers, respecting one another, giving their all when it comes to the daily work requirements and doing all of this with a smile on their face. As you may know already, Cross Country was held last week. A big congratulations to all students who participated in the official run and then with the fun activities later in the day. It was great seeing the parents back supporting their kids from the sideline. Such a great day.

Over the past five weeks I have been in classes helping students to learn different strategies when they spell. Majority of classrooms have now progressed to the Level 2 Blue Thrass Chart and are now starting to be challenged by some really tough words. When at home ask your kids about Thrass. Give them an opportunity to teach you what they are doing.

Ask Yr 3 to 6 students:

- 1. How many sounds are there in the English Language
- 2. What is a long vowel, what is a short vowel?
- 3. How can you tell the difference between a consonant and a vowel? (Ask them about the sticking their finger in their mouth trick)
- 4. What is the process to spell a word
 - a) Say the word
 - b) Spell the word
 - c) Say the word
 - d) Articulate the word
 - e) Clap the word

At this time every year, we seem to be talking head lice. While this is not something that is unusual to everyone, it takes the effort of all to ensure Babinda kids are being treated. In the short term, can I ask that parents/carers take to time to check their kids for head lice. If untreated, this can cause a lot of irritation for the child and increase the possibility of head lice spreading within and across other classes. If your child has head lice, please ensure they are being treated.



Classroom Talk - Senior Secondary Report

<u>Year 12</u>

All year 12 students studying General Subjects have completed their first Internal Assessment for the year. This leaves students studying all General subjects with 12 assessment in the next 16 school weeks. Students studying Applied Subjects could have up to 18 assessment pieces still due before the end of year. Students remaining focused is the key to a successful year 12, please work with us here in maintaining their focus.

Year 11

Year 11 students are now halfway through Unit 1 of their senior schooling. Banking early QCE points and creating study patterns that will assist in unit 3 and 4 is the main focus of this cohort. Please encourage your child to communicate with their teacher when they are experiencing difficulties in their studies. A reminder that subject changes are only able to be made at unit junctures, and can only be made in line with QCE guidelines.

Year 10

Now is a great time for parents to increase conversations with their child in relation to their desired futures as we are less than 6 months away from commencing senior subject selections. The sooner students have a career goal to work towards the easier subject selection for year 11 will become. As many senior subjects have pre-requisites, students need to be applying themselves academically in year 10 in order to meet these conditions. More information regarding senior subject selection, ATAR and QCE will be issued during term 2.

Study Skills

Many students work exceptionally hard and meet their class deadlines, but still find they receive average marks in their assessments. This is because students often think it is enough to simply complete set work in class, and nothing else. Students own study is non-compulsory, meaning students are not held accountable if they don't complete it. Studies have shown that spending only 15-20 minutes per subject per week on non-compulsory study increases students ability to draw on prior learnt materials in exam conditions, resulting in higher academic scores.

Student revision or non-required tasks only need to be 15-20 minutes per week. Here are some ideas:

- Complete 1-2 practice questions from a past exam (found on QCAA website)
- Write a page of notes on a topic covered in class during the week
- Write a page of notes on an extra reading topic related to the course content
- Draw a mind map of the notes written earlier in the week

The Junior Secondary Leaders ran the school pledge to:

Stand Up – if you are a bystander, witnessing bullying and you feel safe enough to stand up and tell the bully their behaviour is not acceptable, do so. This goes the same way for the bullying victim, if you feel safe enough to stand up for yourself and seek help, do so.

Speak Out – If you are being constantly bullied or you know someone who is being constantly bullied and it is affecting them, emotionally, physically or mentally. Speak up and seek help. Go to a trusted teacher or tell a parent or guardian that can tell a teacher.

Walk Away – Walk away from a bully, don't give them the satisfaction of getting a remark or a rebuttal.

As always the Junior Secondary Leaders ran the parade in a very professional manner, they each took turns to talk about the National Day Against Bullying. They encouraged the school community to "take a stand together" and say "Bullying, No Way!"

Significant dates to remember:

1st January - Native Title Act 1993 (commenced 1994) 26th January - Aboriginal Tent Embassy established in front of the Parliament House (1972)

Four men placed a beach umbrella into the lawn of Parliament House. In an iconic protest against the refusal to acknowledge Aboriginal land rights. This act represented for many a symbol of strength and defiance against injustice.

26th January Australia Day – 28th January Australia Day (observed)

12th February - First Aboriginal Welcome to Country conducted at the Parliament House-2008 13th February - National Apology Day-2008

18th February - Anniversary of the Charles Perkins' Freedom Ride. On the 19th Feb. 1965 they arrived in Moree.

They travelled through regional NSW communities fact-finding campaigning and taking action for the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people's rights. They took local indigenous children to swim in the Moree Artesian Baths where they were usually banned. It was aimed to bring attention to (campaign) the poor state of the aboriginal health, education and housing particularly in the country towns to lessen the socially discriminatory barriers which existed between Aboriginal and white residents.

School notices - School Nurse - E-Cigarettes information

A note from the School Nurse: The Royal Children's Hospital Melbourne provides useful information for parents and teens regarding E-cigarettes (also known as vaping).

What are e-cigarettes? Electronic cigarettes (e-cigarettes) are battery-powered devices that come in many forms. They all heat liquids, called e-liquids, into an aerosol that users breathe in. They may contain nicotine, flavourings and a range of harmful and toxic chemicals. Many e-liquids come in flavours that are attractive to young people, such as mango, lime and mint. The e-cigarette heat may also produce toxic substances. Using e-cigarettes is often called 'vaping'. It is sometimes referred to as 'juuling'.

What are the health risks of e-cigarettes? Most e-cigarettes contain nicotine, which is highly addictive especially for teens. E-cigarettes and e-cigarette liquid may contain nicotine, even if they have been labelled 'nicotine free'. One e-liquid pod can contain as much nicotine as a packet of cigarettes. Young people who use e-cigarettes may be more likely to go on to use regular cigarettes. E-liquids can poison children and adults through swallowing or skin contact.

What do e-cigarettes look like? E-cigarette devices come in many different shapes and sizes. They can look like traditional cigarettes, cigars or pipes. Some look everyday items commonly used by young people, such as pens or memory sticks (USBs). Some are even disguised as medical devices or concealed within clothing.

Are e-cigarettes and e-liquids safe? The Australian Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) has not safety tested e-cigarettes or e-liquids, so they should not be considered a safe product. These products are not regulated in Australia and are often purchased online, meaning they can be made anywhere, by anyone and contain anything.

Recommendations for parents: As a parent and caregiver, you have an important role in protecting children from e-cigarettes. Parents should learn about e-cigarettes. It's important to talk to your teen about the health risks of e-cigarettes. Many teenagers are under the misconception that e-cigarettes are safe. It is helpful to know what the different devices look like and the different words young people may use to describe using e-cigarettes. This will help you to talk about e-cigarettes with your teen.

How to talk to teens about the health risks of using e-cigarettes? Talking with teens about risky behaviours is an important way for parents to help keep them safe. Parents are already good at talking to their teens about alcohol, smoking and drugs. E-cigarettes should be included in the conversation. The earlier and more often you speak with young people about e-cigarettes, the more likely they are to listen. It's important for parents to educate themselves, so they know the facts and what to say when the topic comes up.

Finally, young people are more likely to use smoking products if others around them do. Parents can lead by example by not using e-cigarettes at all, especially when children are around.

Key points to remember:

•E-cigarettes and vaping devices heat e-liquids into an aerosol that users breathe in •E-liquids may contain nicotine, flavourings and a range of harmful and toxic chemicals •E-cigarettes are also known as vapes, mods, e-hookahs and juuls

·Using e-cigarettes is sometimes called 'vaping' or 'juuling'

•E-cigarettes and e-liquids have not been safety tested by the TGA in Australia, and should not be considered safe
